

Earth Day Poster

On Earth Day, celebrated each April 22nd in many countries, we give thanks for the Earth's natural resources and reflect on how to sustain the planet for future generations.

You can easily incorporate this activity into a Maths lesson and it's a great way for children to practice using a ruler.

What You Need: - Colour in Paper if you don't have the correct colours.

A 4 inch paper - Blue if possible

A4 Dark Brown paper

A4 Light brown or beige paper

Small piece of yellow paper

Small piece of orange paper

Ruler

Pencil

Math compass

Black marker

Scissors

Glue



What You Do:

1. Help your child trace his hands on the light brown paper to make the owl's wings.
2. On the same piece of light brown paper your child traced his hands on, draw a 5cm x 15 cm rectangle, which will form the owl's head,
3. Ask your child to draw two triangles on the light coloured paper. They should measure 3cm x 3 cm x 3 cm. This is for the ears.
4. Cut out the hands, ears, and a rectangle.
5. Use the scissors to round the corners of the rectangle.
6. Using the dark brown paper, assist your child in drawing a rectangular branch that is 3 cm x 10 cm.
7. Assist your child in drawing the owl's body, a rectangle measuring 14 cm x 20 cm in the same piece of brown paper.
8. Cut out the two rectangles.



9. Help your child round out the corners of the bottom of the owl's body.
10. Using the orange paper, draw and cut out a foot with three toes.
11. Use the first foot as a guide for making the second foot. The most important thing is that the two feet look similar.
12. Ask your child to place the two owl ears base to base on the orange paper, and help your child trace the resulting diamond shape to make the owl's beak.

14. Now he can cut out the feet and beak from the piece of orange paper.
15. Using the compass, help your child draw six 3cm diameter circles on the yellow paper.
16. Cut out the circles.
17. Start putting the it together. Some steps from here on out is part of the creativity of the child and may be altered in anyway seemed fit.
18. Just shapes if needed and use of ideas to complete.
